After everyone had their fill, Pastor Carol led us through a time of brainstorming ideas. (We once again can say that we got to see some of what Pastor Carol does for the District.) These ideas that were shared could be anything we would love to see here at MUMC, no matter how difficult or easy they would be to accomplish; we came up with three pages of ideas. Then the hard part came... everyone was given six stickers to pick their top six priorities.

Pastor Carol was not surprised by the voting of the top priority. In the discussion of the day, and in other discussion, one of the biggest concerns that has been showed is a need to rebuild our sense of community internally. There was damage caused by the pandemic, then pastoral transitions and leaders, followed by disaffiliation issues. Any one of these could make it difficult to hold a community together, but with one on top of another, it has made it very difficult, without intentional work. Thus, the activities getting the greatest number of votes were ideas around building our internal community. We must continue to acknowledge and realize that if we don't rebuild our internal community, it is difficult to draw new people into the life of the congregation.

So, we will be taking time to focus on internal activities such as regular potlucks, game nights, movie nights and restarting the ice cream (social) from Arbela UMC. People volunteered to coordinate much of this work that afternoon.



We also decided that we wanted to do some new things including participate with the M-15 garage sale by hosting a few food trucks with the possibility of renting out spaces on the lawn for "garage sale" sites. All of this is being planned and organized by a committee led by Rich Hebner and Bill Bushaw.

The last area of focus that got a great deal of traction was the need to improve our communica-

tion, both internally and externally. How do we use the tools that we have more effectively to share with the community that we are here. Pat Burns is coordinating that team. Other ideas will be picked up as they fit into the church calendar.



Mission Notes

First, I want to speak to those who attended the planning session after our soup-er potluck lunch on Sunday, February 25th. We were all asked to offer our ideas as to what we would like to see happen in our church in the coming year. Many good social outreach suggestions were made. One suggestion was to have Pastor choose a bible related book for everyone to read and then meet to discuss each chapter. I had the thought to propose that we have a group gather weekly to study the bible. I failed to suggest that, so I am suggesting that now. Maybe we, as a church, could discover the key to follow Jesus' "Great Commission" as well as His "Great Commandment".

Now, what is happening in the Missions we support:

- Grace Children's Hospital in Haiti This hospital treats children and also treats adults. No one is ever refused treatment. They treat malnutrition, Tuberculosis, HIV/AIDS and all respiratory diseases. Five hundred (500) people are seen each day.
- Positive Alternatives We had the pleasure of having their director, April Woodall, speak to us on January 28th. They do a great work with and for parents with unwanted, unplanned pregnancies, giving them a very positive option as opposed to abortion.
- Inter-varsity Ministry to the Greek community at Central Michigan University (CMU). Steve and Bethany Lambert lead a very effective ministry, starting Bible studies in Fraternities and Sororities. In their last newsletter, Steve made this statement, "While church attendance nationally is at a all time low, we had more Greek students attend churches than ever before."
- Peter and Kate Walugembe reported that they have, in the past 6-8 weeks have had many ups and downs. Sick children, and challenges in meeting the needs of many very needy people. She closed their letter with this statement, "I could have written a much different letter (one of a boo-hoo, woe is me one) It's all how you frame it! But we maintain a perspective that it's all about being connected to something bigger going on."

They also thank us for our support.
